Non-fiction books don't need to be read from front to back — choose the parts that are most of interest!	20 Talk Instead of asking your school child "How was your day?", ask them, "Did you read a book or draw a picture?"	21 Sing Say the rhyme 'Five Fat Peas' together and do the actions as you say the words.
